- A gap analysis is being conducted by ACJC Victim Services staff in conjunction with the ACJC Statistical Analysis Unit (SAC) comparing arrest rate data for charges where there is a victim as compared to the number of victim compensation applications received for those crimes.
- A funding report being drafted in collaboration with other victim services funders to determine where funds are going in comparison to where crimes are occurring as indicated by arrest data.
- American Rescue Plan Act dollars and how they will be used for victim compensation.
- Victim Notification System project status.
- Online Victim Compensation Application update.

IV. <u>Victim Assistance Program</u>

Heather provided an update on the current FY22 funding for Crime Victim Assistance and requested direction on what priorities the committee members would want to be included in the recommendation for FY23. The committee discussed options as well as the need to see the reports being developed prior to making a decision. 

ACJC Crime Victim Service staff has partnered with other members of the State Agency Coordinating Team (SACT), and staff from the ACJC Statistical Analysis Center to establish a survey of state and federal victim service funding in Arizona. This survey identifies available state and federal funding by State agency source, and attempts to identify any significant overlap or gaps in available victim service funding. This summarizes the work completed to date and provides a sample of funding information to be included in the final report.

Between FY2019 and FY2021, AZSACT agencies received \$175,368,263.50. The majority of victim assistance funding available to AZSACT agencies comes from federal funds (81.1%), though state and local fund sources account for some of the funding. Agencies within the State Agency Coordinating Team (SACT) noted that a portion of the monies received from federal or state sources are allocated for other costs that indirectly relate to victim services (i.e. state administration costs).

The following chart illustrates the amount of funding available for sub-grantee awards by the administering agency. Of the funds received between FY2019 and FY2021, AZSACT agencies had approximately \$166,816,251.50 available to distribute amongst victim service organizations.

AZSACT agencies were asked to report the amount of monies awarded to sub-grantees in each county. This information can be used to assess how victim service funds are distributed throughout the state.

Recommended Action	The Crime Victims Committee recommends to the Commission that the available funding level for the Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program for FY 2023 be set at \$500,000.
Details/Discussion	The ACJC victim assistance grant program size for FY 2022 was set at \$200,000. Based on revenue projections, available fund balance, and contingent on legislative approval, staff proposes setting the available funding level at \$500,000 for FY 2023. Table VS-1 on the following page shows revenue and expenditures estimates associated with all ACJC victim services program areas and funding sources for FY 2022, and corresponding estimates for FY 2023.

Recommended Action	The Crime Victims Committee recommends to the Commission the funding priority that places the highest emphasis on projects that are identified as VOCA Assistance ineligible, for a period beginning July 1, 2022 and ending June 30, 2023, and that priority be given to projects requesting funding to support Personnel Services and Employee Related Expenses.
Details/Discussion	The ACJC Crime Victim Assistance Program continues to identify and address the needs of victim service projects across the state, and establish funding priorities to help address identified needs. Projects that are VOCA Assistance ineligible projects must meet ACJC victim assistance grant program eligibility requirements.
Fiscal Impact	Significant to agencies seeking ACJC victim assistance grant funding for FY 2023.

Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program FY 2023 Funding Recommendation

Recommended funding priorities place the highest priority on continuing to identify and fund projects that are ineligible for DPS-VOCA Assistance funding.

Any changes made as a result of the FY 2023 funding recommendation can be enhanced or undone in part or in whole in the FY 2024 process.

VOCA Ineligible
