#### I. Call to Order, Roll Call, and Pledge of Allegiance

**Chairperson Sheila Polk** called the meeting to order at 1:30 pm and led everyone in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. **Ms. Boyle** took roll call, and a quorum was declared.

#### II. Minutes of the July 14, 2021 meeting

**Chairperson Polk** called for a motion on the Commission meeting minutes on July 14, 2021. **Commissioner Steve Stahl** entered a motion to approve the minutes. The motion seconded by **Commissioner David Sanders** was unanimously approved by the Commission.

#### III. Executive Director's Review and Performance Evaluation

Motion moved by **Commissioner Steve Stahl** and seconded by **Commissioner Kara Rile**y to go into Executive Session to discuss the performance evaluation of the Executive Director. The motion was approved unanimously. The Commission then went into Executive Session at approximately 1:33 PM. The Commission ended the Executive Session at 1:43 PM.

### IV. Executive Director's Report

#### 1. Staff and Program Updates

**Director LeFevre** discussed the Senior Researcher and Researcher I/II positions open in the SAC unit and the Program Manager position in the Systems Improvement program since Marc Peoples is leaving ACJC. There are also four vacancies in the Commission that include a chief, sheriff, former judge, and mayor. ACJC is working with the Governor's office on the \$1.2M funding for the victims' compensation program. On the grant news, ACJC is waiting to hear about funding for the Comprehensive, Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Program grant (COSSAP). ACJC took over the Bulletproof Vest grant that successfully funded DPS and the Attorney General's Office and is helping manage the Project Safe Neighborhood grant process for the U.S. Attorney's Office. Other endeavors include giving presentations and outreach to groups that include APAAC and the County Supervisors Association. ACJC continues to improve and increase the podcasts with new episodes on staff, news & notes newsletter. The AZ/DC podcast showcases Washington DC stakeholders and how the decisions/policies affect Arizona.

#### 2. Finance Update

Patty Hatvick reviewed the financials for the FY22 1st Quarter, which includes state and federal funds. The spreadsheet contains a new fund "State Aid to Indigent Defense" which will be distributed to the counties on a quarterly basis.

3. Review of ACJC Policy Number CJC-115 for the process to elect a Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson to the Commission Director LeFevre explained the amendment to ACJC's policy on electing a Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson to allow both seats to serve another additional two-year term. Those terms have now come into effect. Director LeFevre then told about the nominating process for the position of Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson. The nominations would remain open until January 2022. Interested Commission members should contact Director LeFevre with the nominations. The nominees' announcement and voting occur at the Commission meeting on January 27, 2022.

#### V. Committee Reports

#### A. Executive Committee

#### 1. Update on the activities of the Executive Committee

**Director LeFevre** covered the Commission member committee appointments/assignments for the following standing committees: Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control; Crime Victim; Information, Technology Systems Improvement; Legislative and Executive.

#### 2. Update on Statistical Analysis Center Activities (SAC)

**Jillian Ware** reviewed items that the SAC unit is working on, including the 2022 Arizona Youth Survey (AYS). Registration started in August, and to date, 37,000 students have signed up. SAC has assisted the Crime Victims program in a funding survey for the state agencies coordinating team. At the next Commission meeting, SAC will have the sexual assault report ready for review and the updated felony report on the reporting front. A new item that SAC is currently working on is the compilation of an overall sheet pointing to various data sources around the state for criminal justice data.

#### 3. Approval of the Fill the Gap Report

**Ms. Ware** gave a brief presentation on the Fill the Gap report. **Commissioner Steve Stahl** entered a motion to approve the Fill the Gap report for distribution. The motion seconded by **Commissioner Kara Riley** was unanimously approved by the Commission.

### B. Drug, Gang & Violent Crime Control Program

#### 1. Update on the activities of the Committee

**Tony Vidale, Deputy Director**, talked about the status of the grants in the Drug program. In the Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental Funding (CESF) grant, 46 projects have \$3.8M in funding balance left to use by January 2022. For the Project Safe Neighborhood grant, the Office of Justice Program (OCP) is waiting to move the grant over to ACJC. In allocations for the other FY21 grant programs, there is \$4M in the Byrne/JAG, \$910,000 in the Residental Substance Abuse Treatment, and \$46,000 to the grant for John R. Justice. In the Sex Offender Registration Notification Act (SORNA), DPS is awarded \$134,000 for compliance in a project, ACJC applies and manages the grant. In the Prison Rape Elimination Act (PREA), the award for the funding is \$67,000 but looking to move the funds to Byrne/JAG since the state complies.

#### 2. FY 2021 Enhanced Drug & Gang Enforcement (EDGE) Report

**Mr. Vidale** reported the FY 2021 Enhanced Drug and Gang Enforcement Report highlights. The report contains activity data reported to ACJC by projects funded out of the Drug and Gang Enforcement Account, including federal and state funding. It reduces illicit drug use and drug-related gang activity throughout the state. **Commissioner Jean Bishop** entered a motion to approve the EDGE report for distribution. The motion seconded by **Commissioner David Sanders** was unanimously approved by the Commission.

#### C. Crime Victims 1. Update on the activities of the Committee

# **Commissioner Stahl** referred to **Heather Bohnet** for Crime Victims Committee updates. **Ms. Bohnet** stated the Committee met on November 10 to discuss the American Rescue Plan Act monies from the Governor's office to help stabilize the fund. Staff is prepared to present the FY2023 victim assistance grant program and review the funding recommendations at the January Commission meeting.

The Committee will meet to review program size and priority areas.

#### D. Information Technology Systems Improvement

#### 1. Update on the activities of the Committee

**Marc Peoples** discussed the updates on the current activities. The Committee met on October 26 and reviewed four projects. The Arizona Protective Order Initiation and Notification Tool (AZPoint) has been in place for 19 months and is providing efficiencies related to the court process and the agency serving the order. In the Victim Notification Statewide System, the workgroup met in two meetings to discuss the program description, how the system works, and selected a vendor. By February or March, the goal is to have the first site online. Lastly, the Data Project involves looking at all the criminal justice systems across the state to gather the data in one central location. Phase two is meeting with potential vendors and evaluating the project's cost. The prosecutor's criminal e-filing discussion moves data elements between the court and the county attorney's systems and the public defender. **Mr. Peoples** then spoke to the Commission and thanked them for their encouragement while working on the projects. **Chair Polk** wished him well on his new job assignment.

#### E. Legislative

#### 1. Update on the activities of the Legislative Committee

**Commissioner Dave Sanders** spoke that the Committee meets every other Friday during the legislative session to monitor, support, or oppose bills pending.

#### 2. Discussion of 2022 Legislative Session and Legislative Priorities

**Molly Edwards** spoke on launching new series of podcasts for ACJC as the leading resource for criminal justice information. She reviewed the bills that pertained to criminal justice and introduced them from the past legislative session. They included HB 2166 Data bill and HB 2260 Membership bill. Also discussed but never introduced was the CCW bill. As the 2022 legislative session begins there are no bills at this time for an introduction.

#### VI. Commission Member Summaries of Current Events

There were no current events.

### INTRODUCTION

This policy establishes the procedures for the formal selection of a Chairperson and Vice Chairperson from within the ranks of the appointed and ex-officio members of the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission (as outlined in ARS §41-2404). These procedures allow for smooth transition of leadership and insure orderly succession. This policy may be waived, as deemed appropriate by a vote of the Commission as a standing body.

### POLICY AND PROCEDURES

**1.** Definitions: The following terms used in this policy may also be found in CJC 101 of the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission policy manual and, where appropriate, in ARS §41-2404.

**A.** "Chairman" (Chair or Chairperson) is the person selected by the members of the Commission (as outlined in ARS §41-2404) to provide general oversight and consultation to the Executive Director, assure that the Commission meets as required by mission and statute, chair and conduct Commission regular and special meetings, approve meeting agendas and any and all other functions deemed appropriate by the Commission as a body or outlined in ARS §41-2404.

**B.** "Vice Chairman" (Vice Chairperson) is the person who, in the absence of the Chairperson (or when asked by the Chairperson), exercises the authority of the Chair on behalf of the Commission and its members as outlined in ARS §41-2404.

**C.** "Term of Chairperson and Vice Chairperson" is the term of office in which members selected from within the ranks of the appointed and ex-officio members of the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission hold these two positions. Terms shall run from the first regular meeting of the Commission in a calendar year for a period not to exceed 24 months. The Chairperson and Vice Chairperson are eligible to be reelected to ne additional term. The Vice Chair may normally succeed the outgoing Chairperson, unless this policy is waived by vote of the Commission or other circumstances dictate.

**D.** "Nominations for Chair and/or Vice Chair" shall be announced in open, public meeting(s), seconded and voted upon by the entire Commission. Those members interested in being considered for either of these two positions will notify the Executive Director during the period of time deemed necessary by the Commission or announce their interest during the open, public meeting and shall follow the normal selection process.

### **Procedure:**

2. Normal Selection

**A.** Calls for nominations for Chairperson and Vice Chairperson.

**1.** During the remaining 90 days of a currently seated Chairperson's term in their position, the Commission shall formally announce the time frame for the formal nomination process during an open, public meeting of the Commission.

**2.** The Commission may accept nominations at the time of the vote if deemed necessary during an open public meeting. Commission members are reminded that pursuant to the Open meeting Law, they may not communicate in any manner with other commission members regarding the nomination or election process.

**3.** All names of those members nominated shall be read in the next open, public meeting of the Commission.

**4.** A vote on the nominees shall be taken at an open, public meeting of the Commission and a new Chair/Vice Chair shall be elected.

- **3**. Special Selection
  - **A.** Requests to waive the policy/nominations from the floor.

**1.** In the event that a seated Chair and/or Vice Chair cannot fulfill the term of these positions or in the event the Commission as a body wishes to waive this policy for a specific election, the following procedures will take place:

**a.** If both the Chairperson and Vice Chairperson are unable to fulfill their positions, the most senior Commissioner shall assume the role of Chair pro tem. The Chair pro tem shall instruct the Executive Director to post on either a special or regularly scheduled Commission meeting agenda a notice for open floor nominations for the Chairperson and Vice Chair. The Chair pro tem shall preside over all duties, as outlined in ARS §41-2404 until replaced by popular vote of the Commission in an open meeting.

**2.** The Chair, for reason of excused absence, may ask any seated member of the Commission to act as Chair for a meeting (in the event of conflict or absence of the Vice Chair). During these meetings the Acting Chair has the full authority of the Chair or Vice Chair.

**B.** If a member of the Commission wishes to petition this body to waive this policy for a specific election, he/she shall notify the Chairperson in writing no later than 36 hours before the time and date of the posted meeting.

**1.** The Chairperson shall instruct the Executive Director to publish and post an amended agenda with an action item for consideration by the Commission as a body, first to waive the process and then to formally accept nominations with a popular vote.

**2.** As in all Commission business, Robert's Rules of Order shall provide guidance as to procedure.
