### • Call to Order, Roll Call and Pledge of Allegiance

**Chair Steve Stahl** called the meeting to order at 1:30 pm and led everyone in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. Executive Director **Andrew LeFevre** took roll call, and a quorum was declared.

 The Commission Members and ACJC Staff recognized the retirement of Wendy Boyle after 20 years of state service

#### 1. Approval of Previous Meeting Minutes

Chair Steve Stahl called for a motion on the Commission meeting minutes on November 16, 2023. Commissioner David Byers entered a motion to approve the minutes. The motion was seconded by Commissioner David Sanders and was unanimously approved by the Commission.

2. Election of a Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson for the next Two Year Cycle Executive Director LeFevre covered the Commission's operating procedures for the election of a chairperson and vice-chairperson. He indicated that no nominations were provided to him in advance of the meeting. Chairperson Stahl made remarks about his continued commitment to the mission of ACJC, but due to his retirement and not being in state for part of the year thought it better if someone else take over as the chair. Director LeFevre opened the nomination period for the chair position and current chair Stahl nominated Dave Byers to be the next ACJC chairperson. Commissioner Sanders seconded the nomination. There being no other names put forward, the nomination was closed and Commissioner Byers was elected as the chair for the Commission starting immediately after the close of the current meeting.

Director LeFevre opened the nomination period for the vice-chair position and Commission Byers nominated Steve Stahl to the be next vice-chair of ACJC. Commissioner Sanders seconded the nomination. There being no other names put forward, the nomination was closed and Steve Stahl was unanimously elected as the vice-chairperson for the Commission starting immediately after the close of the current meeting.

#### 3. Executive Director's Report

He also introduced the Commission Legislative Intern for the semester, Ana Maris, who is a third-year student at ASU. requesting a total of \$2,415,480. Staff recommends that the Commission approve funding five of the requested projects at a total allocation of \$1,737,720.20. The recommendation was moved by Commissioner Byers and Seconded by Commissioner Brad Carlyon. The recommendations was approved unanimously. Director LeFevre thanked the members and indicated that staff will be looking to make a second application period available to try and seek additional applications that meet the programs intent to utilize the remaining funds.

### **Background**

The Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control Grant is a competitive grant opportunity that funds state, local, and tribal government projects that combat drug, gang, and violent crime throughout the state.

Each year, ACJC releases the grant opportunity to eligible criminal justice agencies in Arizona. This year the grant opened on January 29th and closed on February 23rd. All current grantees were notified via email of when the grant solicitation period would open and close. The ACJC Grants Management System (GMS) prohibits applicants from submitting applications after the due date. Following several successive years of late applications, this feature was implemented after the Commission approved the policy not to accept late grant applications due to adverse impacts on staff workload, program resources, and grant process integrity.

The Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control grant application process experienced a notable issue involving late submissions from the Arizona Administrative Office of the Courts (AOC) and the Arizona Department of Public Safety (DPS). Close to the deadline on February 23, ACJC staff noticed that neither AOC nor DPS had submitted their applications, despite both being completed. Attempts to contact both entities were initially unsuccessful. Following the program manager's instructions, an extension to the date and time deadline was made in the GMS system for their submissions. AOC successfully submitted their application at 4:26 PM on the closing day. However, DPS submitted their application on Tuesday, February 28, after the staff adjusted the deadline to accommodate them.

The situation was escalated to the Executive Director, who reached out to both AOC and DPS to communicate that their submissions were past the deadline. It was conveyed that the Commission would consider accepting these applications in their March meeting.

A similar case with the Greenlee County Attorney in July 2021 set a precedent when, under similar circumstances, the Commission accepted their late submission and granted funding. Rejecting the applications from AOC and DPS could significantly affect the funding and progress of critical projects aimed at controlling drug, gang, and violent crimes. It is important to note that both AOC and DPS have been recipients of funding from this grant for an extended period. They have consistently been exemplary in their performance and project execution. This history of excellence underscores the importance of their continued participation in the grant program.

#### Recommendation

Given the precedent, the potential fiscal implications of non-acceptance, and the longstanding and exemplary performance history of both agencies, the Commission is recommended to consider the acceptance of the late applications from AOC and DPS. This action will support the ongoing and successful efforts in combating drug, gang, and violent crimes within Arizona, maintaining the integrity and impact of the grant program.

### **Background Information:**

The Byrne State Crisis Intervention Program Formula (Byrne SCIP) Grant for the fiscal years 2022-2023 represents a significant stride in Arizona's efforts to enhance public safety and health by implementing state crisis intervention initiatives. Funded by the United States Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance (BJA), this program directly responds to the mandates outlined in the Bipartisan Safer Communities Act of 2022. The primary aim of Byrne SCIP is to support Arizona in establishing and running court proceedings and related programs designed for crisis intervention. This encompasses a broad range of initiatives, including extreme risk protection order programs, mental health courts, drug courts, and veterans treatment courts, with a strong emphasis on preventing firearms access to individuals deemed a threat to themselves or others.

Program Goals and Objectives of the Arizona State Crisis Intervention Program Grant (AzSCIP)

- 1. Goal #1: Mitigate Gun Violence in Arizona.
  - a. Objective: Decrease the population at risk of instigating gun violence.
  - b. Objective: Minimize the population vulnerable to becoming gun violence victims.
  - c. Objective: Enhance the availability and accessibility of crisis intervention services to high-risk individuals.
  - d. Objective: Augment public awareness and understanding of gun violence and its preventive measures.
  - e. Objective: Decrease the count of unlawful firearms possessors.
- Goal #2: Preserve Lives by Diminishing the Prevalence of Gun-related Fatalities.
  - Objective: Decrease the occurrences of gun-related homicides.
- a. Objective: Minimize the instances of gun-involved suicides.
  - 3. Goal #3: Decrease the Frequency of Gun-related Injuries.
    - Objective: Reduce incidents of gun-related injuries resulting from deliberate shootings.
- a. Objective: Minimize occurrences of accidental injuries due to firearms.

The AzSCIP Grant opened on October 9, 2023, and closed on November 17, 2023.

A meeting of the AzSCIP Crisis Intervention Advisory Board took place on February 14, 2024. During this meeting, the board approved seven projects to be forwarded to the BJA for their review and potential approval. Additionally, the board identified three projects that required revisions to better align with the grant's objectives and directed these to be returned to the applicants for the necessary modifications.

The seven projects endorsed by the Advisory Board were sent to the BJA on February 26, 2024. The BJA completed its review and approved all seven projects by February 29, 2024. Upon Commission approval, staff will send grant agreements to the recipient agencies with a project start date of April 1, 2024.

The three agencies advised to revise their grant proposals were notified immediately on the day of the Advisory Board meeting, February 14, detailing the specific areas of their applications that required refinement. A deadline was set for March 15, 2024, to submit these revised applications. Upon receipt, the staff will thoroughly review the revisions and prepare a recommendation to the Advisory Board for their approval. Should these revised projects gain the Advisory Board's endorsement, they, too, will be forwarded to the BJA for review and approval, mirroring the process followed by the initially approved projects.

Arizona Coalition for Victim Services is seeking funding to provide training for advocates, non-profit staff, volunteers, law enforcement, and others who work with victims. The funding would cover staff, training site costs, speaker fees, hotel, travel, and per diem for speakers, presenters, and trainees. The funds will cover 2 Basic Academies, 4 Advanced Academies, and 2 Leadership trainings with minimal to no cost to participants. This would provide training for an estimated 350 individuals.

Arizona Crime Victim Rights Law Group is seeking funding to provide training on restitution for victims to prosecutors and victims advocates. The funding would cover presenter expenses, facility rental, and training supplies. The funds will cover 20 training sessions with 15 participants per training for an estimated 300 individuals.

#### **VINE/HB 2482**

HB 2482 established the Crime Victim Notification Fund that will expand our current system. The fund received an appropriation of \$10,000,000. In addition, the Treasurer's Office has transferred an additional \$3,285,338.39. The State Procurement Office is completing its process to award a contract.

### **ADRS**

ADRS is the Arizona Disposition Reporting System which allows criminal justice agencies to submit criminal history records to DPS electronically. ACJC continues to work with county attorney's offices to complete the integration from their case management system to ADRS. ACJC is currently working with Coconino and Pinal counties to complete testing requirements for the ADRS XML integration.

#### **AZPoint**

AZPOINT is the Arizona Protective Order Initiation & Notification Tool. The goal of AZPOINT is to protect plaintiffs and increase public safety by automating portions of the protective order process. Additional funding has been secured to complete enhancements to the system. These enhancements will provide tools to law enforcement agencies to improve user management and notification times.

### **2024 National Criminal History Improvement Program Grants**

2024 NCHIP grants are now open. This year focuses on priority on improving dispositions and mental health submissions accessible to the National Instant Criminal Background Check System (NICS), including full participation in the National Crime Information Center (NCIC), criminal history record information available through the Interstate Identification Index (III) and National Fingerprint File (NFF).
