#### Arizona Criminal Justice Commission Meeting Minutes January 27, 2022

A public meeting of the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission convened on **January 27**, **2022**, at the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission office, 1110 W. Washington, Suite 230, Phoenix, AZ 85007.

#### I. Call to Order, Roll Call, and Pledge of Allegiance

Vice-Chairperson Steve Stahl called the meeting to order at 1:30 pm and led everyone in reciting the Pledge of Allegiance. Ms. Boyle took roll call, and a quorum was declared.

#### II. Stakeholder Group Updates

**Elizabeth Ortiz, APAAC** reported that APAAC provides multi-disciplinary training each year. The agency launched registration for the human trafficking conference, specifically human trafficking investigation and prosecution being held on April 1, 2022, Rio Salado Conference Center, reporting on different case studies by prosecutors, investigators, and criminalists.

#### III. Minutes of the November 4, 2021 meeting

**Vice-Chairperson Stahl** called for a motion on the Commission meeting minutes on November 4, 2021. **Commissioner David Sanders** entered a motion to approve the minutes. The motion seconded by **Commissioner David Byers** was unanimously approved by the Commission.

#### IV. The election of a Chairperson and Vice-Chairperson for the Commission

Executive Director Andrew LeFevre opened up the nomination process. Commissioner Byers moved to open the nominations for Chairperson, and Commissioner Jean Bishop seconded the motion. Commissioner Byers entered a motion to nominate Commissioner Steve Stahl as Chairperson of the Commission, with Designee Rebecca Baker seconding the motion. Mr. LeFevre called for additional nominations, and there were none. Mr. LeFevre then called for a motion to close the nominations for Chairperson. Designee Tim Chung moved to close the nominations, and Commissioner Bishop seconded the motion. Mr. LeFevre congratulated Commissioner Stahl as the newly elected Chairperson for a two-year term.

Mr. LeFevre asked for a motion to open up the nominations for the Vice-Chairperson position. **Commissioner Bishop** moved to open the nominations for Vice-Chairperson, and **Designee Tim Chung** seconded the motion. **Chairperson Stahl** entered a motion to nominate Commissioner Sheila Polk as the Vice-Chairperson of the Commission, and **Commissioner Bishop** seconded the motion. **Mr. LeFevre** called for additional nominations, and there were none. **Mr. LeFevre** then called for a motion to close the nominations for Vice-Chairperson. **Designee Chung** moved to close the nominations, and **Designee Baker** seconded the motion. Mr. LeFevre stated ACJC staff would reach out to Commissioner Polk and congratulate her on the Vice-Chairperson position.

#### V. Executive Director's Report

#### 1. Staff and Program Update

Mr. LeFevre briefed the Commission on staffing and program information. ACJC is commemorating the 40th anniversary of the Commission and proudly has a banner on our website promoting it. Also, there are four vacancies on the Commission membership. ACJC welcomes Mary Pagnillo as the legislative intern and Lloyd Y. Asato as the Program Manager for the Criminal Justice Systems Improvement Program. Also joining the ACJC staff is former staffer Simone Courter, the Prevention Project Manager overseeing the Youth Mentoring grant and the Comprehensive Opioid, Stimulant, and Substance Abuse Program (COSSAP) grant.

#### 2. Finance Update

Patty Hatvick discussed the new financial report format covering the period July-December of the current fiscal year on page one. This page indicates the total state and federal appropriations, beginning cash balances, fund balances, appropriated funds, budget, and revenues received with percentages comparing budget to actual. Page two is the breakdown of the state funds, and page three is the breakdown of the federal grants. ACJC staff requested that page one of the financial report be presented to the Commission only, and pages 2-3 shown in the Committee meetings.

#### VI. Committee Reports

#### A. Executive Committee

#### 1. Update on the activities of the Committee

There were no items on the Executive Committee to report.

#### 2. Update on Statistical Analysis Center Activities (SAC)

**Jillian Ware** reported that the AYS survey is on schedule to get underway in February, and materials currently were sent out to the first round of schools. There are 259 schools enrolled, 310 committed, and 81,000 students registered. Other projects include an updated felony criminal code report and performance measures and reporting standards for the Arizona youth mentoring grant.

#### 3. Approval of the Sexual Assault Report

Jillian Ware gave a brief presentation of the Sexual Assault Report that uses criminal history data from DPS. There were 1,604 sexual assault-related arrests between 2015-2019, with at least one sexual assault charge in all but six arrests under Arrests, Charges, and Offenders. Prosecutors filed one thousand forty-nine arrests over the five years, with 770 charges filed for sexual assault. 75.4 percent of arrestees were white males and 63.6 percent 35 years or younger at the time of the arrest. The Outcomes lead to 880 arrests to convictions. 81.5 percent of cases with at least one sexual assault conviction led to a prison sentence compared to 42,7 percent of cases with other offense convictions only. In Domestic Violence, 372 records had at least one sexual assault arrest charge flagged for domestic violence, 86 arrests resulted in a sexual assault conviction, 74 resulted in a prison sentence. Forty-six domestic violence-related sexual assault records had no disposition information available for any arrest charges. Commissioner Bishop entered a motion to approve the Sexual Assault Report. The motion seconded by Designee Baker was unanimously approved by the Commission.

#### B. Drug, Gang & Violent Crime Control Program

#### 1. Update on the activities of Committee

Tony Vidale, Deputy Director, stated the Committee met on January 12 and discussed the availability of funds from the RSAT grant. Staff was seeking direction from the Committee on the balance of \$2M on utilizing the funds for the next grant cycle in 2023. The focus is on providing resources to current projects as a priority and identifying new potential counties to implement an RSAT program. Staff is working on funding availability for the FY 2023 Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control grant and estimates an increase of \$200,000 for the grant program. The AZ Coronavirus Emergency Supplemental grant ended January 2022 as a two-year grant. Staff administered \$11.1M to 56 grantees with \$2.6M remaining unspent. Grantees have 60 days to submit reimbursements, and staff estimates 10 percent will remain unspent and the Commission would have less than a year to spend the remaining funds. We currently have a one-year no-cost extension from the BJA. The monies are returned to the federal government if unused.

#### C. Crime Victims

#### 1. Update on the activities of the Committee

Chair Stahl reported the Committee met on January 12th and referred to Heather Bohnet, Program Manager, to present the following three agenda items.

#### 2. FY2023 Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program Funding Level

Ms. Bohnet reported that the proposal is to make the available funding level for FY 2023 set at \$500,000 for the Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program based on revenue projections. Ms. Bohnet directed the Commission to Table VS-1 in the agenda showing all ACJC victim services program areas and funding sources for FY 2022 and estimates for FY 2023. Ms. Bohnet also noted the \$1.2M for the American Rescue Plan Act from the Governor's office granted in January 2022 to specifically use for victim compensation benefits with a deadline of December 2022 to expend. Designee Greg Lauchner entered a motion to approve the Crime Victims Assistance Grant Program funding for FY 2023 set at \$500,000. The motion seconded by Commissioner David Sanders was unanimously approved by the Commission.

#### 3. FY2023 Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program Funding Priorities

Ms. Bohnet presented the recommendation for funding the FY 2023 Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program. 1.) The funding priority is placing the highest emphasis on identifying and funding projects that are ineligible for DPS-VOCA Assistance funding. 2.) Under the budget category prioritization, projects requesting funding to support Personnel Services and Employee Related Expenses. **Designee Baker** entered a motion approving the funding priority that places the highest attention on projects identified as VOCA Assistance ineligible for beginning July 1, 2022, and ending June 30, 2023; and preference to projects requesting funding supporting Personnel Services and Employee Related Expenses. The motion seconded by **Commissioner Bishop** was unanimously approved by the Commission.

#### 4 FY22 Compensation program ARPA Benefit Allocation

Ms. Bohnet spoke about the supplemental appropriation for the current fiscal year at \$1.75M for the victim compensation fund and the proposed general funding for the same amount to the next fiscal year to the victim compensation and assistance fund from the Governor's proposed budget. Staff recommends a small portion of the ARPA funds allocated to current county programs, as seen in Table VS-2. Designee Chung entered a motion approving the ARPA funds for the current FY22 distributed to operational units according to the chart on page 22 of the agenda. The motion seconded by Designee Baker was unanimously approved by the Commission.

#### D. Information Technology Systems Improvement

#### 1. Update on the activities of Committee

Commissioner Byers explained that the Committee did not meet since ACJC was hiring new staff for the Program Manager position. The focus is on the rollout of the warrant system for the next meeting.

#### E. Legislative

#### 1. Update on the activities of the Committee

Commissioner Sanders stated the Committee met on January 6 and 21. The Commission has introduced bills that include minimum funding levels for victim compensation and assistance fund and the criminal justice enhancement fund. If the funding does not work out, the funds will come from the state's general fund. Several bills have dropped to change the membership composition to the Commission, and staff is monitoring those.

#### 2. Update on ACJC Priority Legislation and other introduced bills that impact the Criminal Justice System

Molly Edward, Public Information Officer, reviewed the legislature has met in session for 18 days and 1,212 bills introduced to date. Representative Kavanagh has agreed to sponsor two bills. HB2132-Minimum Balance Notification Victim Fund bill for victim compensation and assistance; and HB 2133-Criminal Justice Monies assessment, victims rights enforcement, criminal justice enhancement fund bill that the Commission approved to move forward and both assigned to judiciary and appropriations. HB2132 - the victim compensation bill, asking the legislature to appropriate \$12.5M each year from the general fund to the victim compensation and assistance fund. HB2133 is the Criminal Justice Monies Penalty Assessment bill that addresses assessments to civil and criminal citations. ACJC is tracking over 100 bills and monitoring specific bills that list ACJC.

Details/Discussion	The Commission is required to annually designate one operational unit (OU) for each county, to receive an allocation from state and/or federal compensation fund sources, and to administer the Crime Victim Compensation Program for that county during the state fiscal year. In accordance with compensation program rule R10-4-104(A) all 15 County Attorney's Offices are requesting designation as operational units for FY 2023. Staff proposes continuing the current designation of the County Attorney's Offices as operational units for FY 2023.
Fiscal Impact	Significant – Operational Units are responsible for the expenditure of state and federal Crime Victim Compensation funds for FY 2023.

Recommended Action	The Commission approve the allocation of \$4,380,000 in state and federal crime victim compensation funds, and ARPA funds, as proposed in Table VS-3 of the agenda, to operational units (OU) for the FY23 Crime Victim Compensation Program.
Details/Discussion	Table VS-3 reflects the dollar amounts proposed for allocation to each operational unit for the 15 counties. The allocation formula approved at the March 2020 Commission meeting includes the following process steps:  • \$50,000 of the state funds retained in emergency reserve (R10-4-102.D);  • Five percent of most recent federal VOCA award allocated to ACJC for administrative costs;  • Fixed administrative allocation of state funds to each OU (R10-4-102.H)  • A base allotment of \$25,000 to each OU;  • The remaining balance distributed as follows:  • 50% based on prior years' program benefit expenditure average;  • 30% based on an average share of crime;
