## Crime Victims Committee Minutes March 8, 2023

A public meeting of the Crime Victims Committee of the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission was convened on March 8, 2023 at 1:30p.m., at the Arizona Criminal Justice Commission office, 1110 W. Washington St., Ste 230, Phoenix, AZ, 85007.

#### I. Call to Order and Roll Call

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Steve Stahl at 1:30 p.m. The roll was taken, and a quorum was declared present.

#### II. Review and Approval of the Minutes of the November 9, 2022 Meeting

Shawn Cox moved to accept the minutes, Virginia Rodriguez seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

#### III. Crime Victim Compensation Program

#### A. FY23 Program Benefit Funding Reallocation

Heather Bohnet provided an update on current fiscal year expenditures, remaining funds potentially available for reallocation, ARPA funds which may becom available at a future date, and a recommendation for reallocation/supplemental allocation of funds. Shawn Cox moved that the Crime Victims Committee recommends to the Commission that compensation funds for the current FY23 be reallocated to operational units in accordance with Table VS-1 of the agenda. Kirsten flores seconded. Motion passed unanimously.

### **B. FY24 Compensation Program Funding**

Heather Bohnet reviewed information on available funds and the recommendation for total victim compensation program size for FY24. The committee discussed the proposal. Shawn Cox moved that The Crime Victims Committee recommends to the Commission that total state, federal and ARPA allocated funding for the FY24 Crime Victim Compensation Program be set at \$6,619,100; including \$1,050,000 in state compensation funds, \$69,100 in federal VOCA compensation funds, and \$5,500,000 in ARPA funds, contingent on the receipt of ARPA funds by July 1, 2023. If ARPA funds are not received by July 1, 2023, the total total state and federal allocated funding for the FY24 Crime Victim Compensation Program be set at \$4,569,100; including \$3,200,000 in state compensation funds, \$1,369,100 in federal VOCA compensation funds. Phil Dougherty seconded the motion. The motion passed unanimously.

#### C. FY24 Designation of Operational Units

Heather Bohnet explained the process for designating the operational units for FY24, indicating that all 15 county attorney's have requested to continue as operational units. Phil Dougherty moved the Crime Victims Committee recommends to the Commission designating the 15 County Attorney's Offices as operational units for the FY 2024 Crime Victim Compensation Program. Shawn Cox seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

#### D. FY24 Compensation Program Funding Allocation

Heather Bohnet presented the recommendation for allocation of the FY24 Victim Compensation program funds to each operational unit for both administrative costs and victim compensation benefits, explaining the differences between two funding plans depending on the availability of ARPA funds by July 1, 2023. Heather explained that the recommendation for changes to administrative costs was not included in the 15 counties, but staff are reviewing those costs and will bring future recommendations in changes to administrative costs back to the committee in the future. Shawn Cox moved that the Crime Victims Committee recommends to the Commission the allocation of \$6,619,000 in state and federal crime victim compensation funds, and ARPA funds, as proposed in Table VS-4 of the agenda, to operational units (OU) for the FY24 Crime Victim Compensation Program, contingent on the receipt of ARPA funds. If ARPA funds are not received by July 1, 2023, the Crime Victims Committee recommends the allocation of \$4,569,100 in state and federal funds as proposed in Table VS-5 of the agenda, to operational units (OU) for the FY24 Crime Victim Compensation Program. Virginia Rodriguez seconded. The motion passed unanimously.

#### IV. Summary of Current Events

Andrew LeFevre provided an update on legislation currently being considered that will impact ACJC Victim Services. Heather Bohnet provided information on Victim Rights Week in April.

#### V. Call to the Public

No one requested to publicly comment by phone or email.

# **Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program**

# **FY 2024 Funding Recommendation**

The Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program is established to provide grant awards to support direct services to crime victims in the State of Arizona. At the January 2023 meeting, the Commission determined no program size would be set until the solicitation process had been completed.

## **Applications Received**

On January 30, 2023, the FY24 Crime Victim Assistance Program grant application period opened. The deadline for submission of applications was Friday, March 10, 2023, at 3:00 p.m. Thirty eight applications were submitted by the deadline.

## **Evaluation and Scoring**

All grant application requests were evaluated in accordance with A.R.S. § 41-2702. All applications received were reviewed and scored by three individuals including ACJC staff and outside evaluators. Scoring was based on the Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program rules, application criteria, and priorities approved by the Commission.

### **FY 2024 Funding Recommendation**

For applications recommended for funding, all associated budget requests were analyzed by staff. Funding allocations were made based on the needs of the applicant program, and how funding increased the ability of the Victim Assistance Grant Program to meet the established priorities.

Staff recommends funding of \$813,464.40 in FY24 Crime Victim Assistance grant funds as indicated in Table VS-1 of the agenda. Under the proposal, the funding would support eligible costs for grant projects, allocating \$664,580.34 in personal services, \$148,884.06 in employee-related expenditures.

Table VS-1 displays the staff recommendation for funding allocations to all applicant agencies. The table summarizes the FY23 grant awards, FY24 grant requests, and proposed FY24 awards for all applicants.

## **Program Background**

In accordance with A.A.C. R10-4-204, services eligible to receive funding during the FY 2024 grant period may include:

- 1. Crisis intervention services to meet the urgent emotional or physical needs of a victim. Crisis intervention services may include a 24-hour hotline for counseling or referrals for a victim;
- 2. Emergency services such as:
  - a. Temporary shelter for a victim who cannot safely remain incurrent lodging;
  - b. Emergency financial assistance for immediate needs related to transportation, food, shelter, and other necessities; and
  - c. Temporary repairs to doors, locks and windows damaged as a result of a crime to prevent further victimization;
- 3. Support services, such as:
  - a. Assistance dealing with the effects of victimization;
  - b. Assistance dealing with other social services and criminal justice agencies;
  - c. Assistance in replacing, or obtaining the return of property kept as evidence;
  - d. Assistance in dealing with the victim's landlord or employer; and
  - e. Referral to other sources of assistance as needed;
- 4. Court-related services, such as:
  - a. Direct services or financial assistance that helps a victim participate in criminal justice proceedings, such as child care, meals, and parking expenses; and
  - b. Advocate services such as escorting a victim to criminal justice-related interviews, court proceedings, and assistance in accessing temporary protection services; and
- 5. Notification services, such as those found in A.R.S Title 13, Chapter 40, Crime Victims' Rights.
- 6. Training for paid or volunteer staff of agencies who provide services directly benefiting victims; and
- 7. Produce educational or outreach materials describing the services available, how to obtain project assistance, and volunteer opportunities

## **Allocation Guidelines**

For applicants scored as eligible, all expenditure types were analyzed by staff and allocated based on the applicant's scored application and on the needs and best interests of the grants program in meeting the Crime Vicitm Assistance Program criteria. The following guidelines were used by staff to develop the recommendation:

- Anticipated total amount to be awarded under this solicitation: \$750,000
- Maximum Dollar Amount of Awards: \$75,000
- Fund positions and the associated ERE before considering any other budget category
- Avoid funding multiple FTE positions for any project
- Prioritize funding positions providing direct to victims of crime within projects with requests for multiple positions

#### **Additional Guidelines**

In addition to the information provided in each grant application, staff considered other factors to determine allocations to individual projects. These factors include performance-based variables such as project evaluation factors and grant administration.

Details/Discussion	ACJC crime victim compensation program staff closely monitors county victim compensation expenditures throughout the fiscal year. Periodically it is necessary to adjust the original allocation to meet demand for compensation benefits statewide. The purpose of these adjustments is to allocate compensation funding to those counties with enough demand to expend additional compensation funds by the end of the fiscal year. With the receipt of ARPA funds, supplemental funds for compensation benefits are available.
