I. Call to Order, Roll Call and Pledge of Allegiance

The meeting was called to order by Chairperson Sheila Polk at 1:30 pm who led the Pledge of Allegiance. Roll call was taken, and a quorum was declared present.

II. Minutes of the January 24, 2019 Meeting.

Chairperson Polk called for a motion on the minutes of the Commission meeting held on January 24, 2019. Commissioner Sharp entered a motion to approve the minutes. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Brugman and was approved by the Commission with one abstention by Commissioner Williams.

III. Executive Director's Report

1. Staff and Program Updates

Executive Director LeFevre informed the Commission that SAC Director Catie Clark left the agency, and Deputy Director Vidale is taking over the SAC unit as interim manager. ACJC is evaluating the skill sets of the SAC department, the current workload, and projects. In staffing, ACJC will be looking to hire a SAC director by the end of the fiscal year and is in the process of posting for a research analyst I position. ACJC is continuing work on the Comprehensive Opioid Abuse Prevention (COAP) grant from the Bureau of Justice Assistance. Last meeting centered on integrating a statewide plan to get law enforcement more involved in prevention efforts by sending a survey to the coalitions for a better sense on what resources and tools the groups can use. Started discussions with ASU on the implementation of the 2020 AYS survey and finalizing the contract. The Victim Rights week is April 7-13, and ACJC is partnering for the statewide event. ACJC is proud of the partnership with the Governor's Office of Youth, Faith, and Family (GOYFF) through the Substance Abuse Partnership and the Epidemiology Work Group. GOYFF wrote ACJC into the substance abuse & mental health services administration (SAMHSA) grant for \$150,000 in the next five years to support some of the SAC work and support staff. Having conversations with John Allen, Chairman of the House Judiciary Committee, on the topic of criminal justice reform. He is considering working through the budget process to have ACJC receive two FTEs over the next 6-9 months to do research and provide answers to questions identified by the legislature. This shows a growing awareness and appreciation of the work that the Statistical Analysis Center does. Director LeFevre presented the Commission with a document that the staff has produced over the course of several months containing an internal organizational vision and values statement on how the staff's work and direction fit in the Commission mission statement.

2. Finance Update

Patty Hatvick presented a financial report as of February 2019. The staff has begun to plan for the fiscal year end. For the CJEF funding, total revenues received were at 65 percent, expenditures at 53 percent, whereas the Crime Lab income was at 66 percent and spending at 75 percent. For the Victim grant, the revenue is at 65 percent, and the costs are at 68.6 percent. On the APRC fund, the income is 58 percent and expenses at 71 percent. For the State Aid/County Attorneys fund, the revenues will be distributed the first week in April and the last week in June. The fingerprint fund received \$450,000, and appropriations totaled \$600,000; also, the DEA received 50 percent of the revenues and spent 60 percent of the expenses.

IV. Committee Reports

A. Executive

1. Update on the activities of the Executive Committee

Chairperson Polk reported the Committee had not met, and there were no activities to report.

2. Update on Statistical Analysis Center Projects

Executive Director LeFevre noted the SAC unit has provided data requests for AYS and is looking at finding a better way to disseminate the information quickly, and is asking ASU to deliver the data in a different format to process the data.

B. Drug, Gang and Violent Crime Control

1. Update on the activities of the Drug, Gang & Violent Crime Committee

Chairperson Brugman stated the Committee would meet on April 25, 2019.

C. Crime Victims

Update on the activities of the Crime Victims Committee

Chairperson Ryan reported the Committee met on March 5, 2019, and referred to Program Manager Larry Grubbs for the presentation of the agenda items.

2. A. FY19 Program Benefit Funding Reallocation

Commissioner Ryan entered a motion to approve that compensation funds for the current FY19 be reallocated to the operational units as proposed in Table VS-1 on page 13 of the agenda using the fund sources identified. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Brugman and was unanimously approved by the Commission.

B. FY20 State and Federal Funding Amount

Commissioner Montgomery entered a motion to approve the total state and federal funding for the FY20 Crime Victim Compensation Program set at \$4,563,887; including \$3,500,000 in state compensation funds and \$1,063,887 in federal VOCA compensation funds. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Mengarelli and was unanimously approved by the Commission.

C. FY20 Designation of Operational Units

Commissioner Brugman entered a motion to approve the designation of the 15 County Attorney Offices as operational units for the FY20 Crime Victim Compensation Program. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Stahl and was unanimously approved by the Commission.

D. FY20 Program Funding Allocation

Commissioner Stahl entered a motion to approve the allocation of \$4,563,887 in state and federal crime victim compensation funds, as proposed in Table VS-3 page 18 of the agenda, to operational units for the FY20 Crime Victim Compensation Program. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Brugman and was unanimously approved by the Commission.

3. Victim Compensation & Assistance Fund Balance

Larry Grubbs noted that the last two fiscal years, the fund balance reduction experienced by the Victim Compensation & Assistance fund is around \$874,000 each year. Mr. Grubbs reported that the Crime Victims Committee discussed the appropriate fund balance to maintain and whether to prioritize victim assistance over victim compensation when considering program reductions, as well as looking at strategies to find other fund sources.

E. Information Technology Systems Improvement

1. Update on the activities of the Information Technology Systems Improvement Committee

Chairperson Byers informed the Commission that there were two items to present to the Commission and referred to Heather Bohnet and Kyle Walraven.

2. Full-Service Forensic Crime Laboratory Grant Program

Heather Bohnet, Grant Coordinator, presented the F20 Full Service Forensic Crime Laboratory grant proposals and allocations of funds for \$700,000 in a handout to the Commission. Commissioner David Byers entered a motion to approve the Full-Service Forensic Crime Laboratory grant allocations in the amount of \$700,000 for FY20 grant program cycle of July 1, 2019, through June 30, 2020. The motion was seconded by Commissioner Brugman and was unanimously approved by the Commission.

3. Criminal Justice Related IT Project

Kyle Walraven, Project Manager, reviewed the project status report on the Orders of Protection. The purpose was to show the work completed for the month of February and to show the total life-cycle of the project and deliverables in terms of completion. If the project stays on track, March has 25 deliverables due that estimates at 38 percent completion by April 1st, in April there are 34 deliverables due that forecasts at 66 percent completed by May 1st, and in May there are 30 deliverables with assessments at 91 percent completion by June 1st. The goal is to have a pilot program in July with the Maricopa County Sheriff's Office, Glendale Police Department, and the Glendale City Court. Future presentations will be set with the Sheriffs Association, AZ Association of Chiefs of Police and the Law Enforcement Summit to recruit more agencies to conduct the pilots and to make them aware of training in October.

F. Legislative

1. Update on the activities of the Legislative Committee

Chairperson Sanders reported the Executive and Legislative Committees meet every other Friday during the legislative session and have met on January 18, February 1 and 15, March 1. He referred to Executive Director LeFevre to review the legislation.

2. Review of Active Legislation

Executive Director LeFevre provided a Bill Tracklist as of 3/15/19 for the Commission to review. The ACJC membership bill did not go through and did not meet the crossover deadline. ACJC has considered SB 1250 a priority, and Senator Steele introduced the Sexual Assault Protective Order bill. Staff met with the Senator to propose changing the language removing that a victim must wait for the assault to happen twice before filing an order of protection with the change being the assault to occur once before filing.

V. Commission Member Summaries of Current Events

Commissioner Brugman brought up the Law Enforcement Summit this year scheduled for July 16-18 in Flagstaff. Executive Director LeFevre stated there are two vacancies on the Commission. Judge Ron Reinstein has expressed interest in the seat and ACJC has contacted the Sheriffs Association for the other open spot.

VI. Call to the Public

Chairperson Polk made a call to the public. Donna Hamm, Executive Director of Middle Ground Prison Reform and Retired Judge, spoke to the Commission on a striker bill SB 1037.

VII. Date, Time and Location of Next Meeting

The Commission approves the award for the Arizona Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control Cycle 33 grant funds as displayed on page 17 of the agenda to eligible criminal justice agencies for the period beginning July 1, 2019 and ending June 30, 2020, except the Attorney General's Office Medicaid Fraud project, which will be funded from October 1, 2019 and end September 30, 2020.

Program Background

The Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control Program (DC) allow state, county, local and tribal governments to support activities that combat drugs, gangs, and violent crime. The DC program provides funding to support the components of a statewide, system-wide enhanced drug, gang, and violent crime control program as stated in the *2016-2019 Arizona Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control Strategy*. The strategy includes the following two goals for the foundation and direction of the program:

- Curtail the flow of illicit drugs, drug proceeds, and instruments used to perpetuate violence across Arizona.
- Reduce violent crime and illicit drug use and deter repeat offenders in Arizona.

The strategy also outlines purpose areas as a guide to funding projects meant to address the drug, gang, and violent crime problem in the state. These purpose areas are as follows:

- Apprehension
- Prosecution
- Forensic Support Services
- Adjudication & Sentencing
- Corrections & Community Corrections
- Substance Abuse Treatment for Corrections-Involved Individuals
- Prevention and Education

In FY 2019, grant awards were made in the amount of \$8.66 million. These funds were awarded to projects addressing apprehension of drug offenders, prosecution of drug offenses, statewide forfeiture activities, forensic support of task forces, drug adjudication projects, and correctional substance abuse treatment. Table *DC 1* on page 13 shows a summary of the FY 2019 grant awards, the FY 2020 grant requests made by applicants, and the FY 2020 proposed projects.

Funding

The program is supported by several funding streams to successfully carry out the statewide strategy. The Edward Byrne Memorial Justice Assistance Grant (Byrne/JAG) funds awarded to Arizona by the U.S. Department of Justice, Bureau of Justice Assistance (DOJ/BJA) continue to support program activities along with state Drug and Gang Enforcement Fund (DEA) monies established under A.R.S. §41-2402, and matching funds when approved by the Commission. The Commission currently applies a match requirement of 25 percent for this grant program.

In FY 2019, \$8.66 million was allocated to grant projects. This amount was comprised of \$3.0 million in Byrne/JAG funds, \$3.5 million in DEA funds, and \$2.1 million in matching funds.

For FY 2020, the staff is proposing a program size of \$9,100,970. Of this amount, \$3,150,705 is from the federal Byrne/JAG grant, \$3,699,757 is from the state DEA fund, and \$2,250,508 is from matching funds. The FY 2020 program size represents an increase of \$438,576, or 5 percent above the FY 2019 program size. Table *DC 2* summarizes the change in program size, by fund source, for FY 2019 approved and FY 2020 recommended.

Applications Received

The solicitation for the Drug, Gang, and Violent Crime Control Program opened February 4, 2019, and closed March 1, 2019, at 3 p.m. Thirty-five applications were received requesting a total of \$13,919,487. Of the 35 applications, 14 were apprehension projects (Tier 1), 16 were prosecution projects (Tier 1), one was a statewide forfeiture project (Tier 1), two were forensic support projects (Tier 2), one was a drug adjudication project (Tier 2), and one was a corrections project (Tier 2). Table *DC 3* on page 18 displays the grant request for each eligible applicant broken out by priority area and expenditure type.

Evaluation and Scoring

Eligible applications were reviewed by an evaluation team and scored based on the criteria published in the solicitation with an emphasis on the goals of the statewide strategy. Also, the solicitation emphasized that personnel expenditures would be prioritized in the grant recommendation allocation.

Recommendation

Staff recommends funding \$9,100,970 and allocated according to Table *DC 4* on page 19. Under the proposal, \$3,252,066 would be allocated to Tier 1 apprehension projects, \$3,329,468 for Tier 1 prosecution projects, \$637,429 for a Tier 1 statewide forfeiture project, \$445,540 for Tier 2 forensic support projects, \$1,336,467 for a Tier 2 drug adjudication project, and \$100,000 for a Tier 2 corrections project. The total grant project amount is comprised of \$6,850,462 in grant funds and \$2,250,508 in match funds. The funding would support eligible costs for grant projects, allocating \$5,810,029 in personal services, \$2,807,323 in employee-related expenditures, and \$383,618 in overtime expenditures, and \$100,000 in contract services.

All the projects recommended for funding in FY 2020 received funding in FY 2019. All projects received an increase in funding above the FY 2019 levels unless program costs submitted in the application were less than the FY 2019 funded amount.

The Santa Cruz County Attorney's Office did not apply for the FY 2020 grant program.

Allocation Guidelines

For applicants scored as eligible, all expenditure types were analyzed by staff and allocated based on the needs and best interests of the grant program in meeting the statewide strategy. The following guidelines were used by staff to build the recommendation:

- Prioritize previously funded projects that demonstrate effectiveness.
- Maintain as much balance funding as possible between tier one apprehension and prosecution projects.
- Fund at least one tier one apprehension project and prosecution project in each county.

- Provide some level of funding to tier two projects impacted by apprehension and prosecution activities.
- Prioritize funding core operations positions. Core operations positions are those considered most critical in meeting the purposes of the strategy (i.e., task force officers, attorneys, criminalists).
- Fund a position and the associated ERE at the current costs as reported by the agency in the application.
- As a priority, fund personal services, ERE, and overtime before considering any other budget category.
- Avoid funding multiple support-type positions for any project until core position needs are met.
- Apply salary and ERE caps.

Salary and ERE caps

Salary and ERE caps were calculated using costs for positions and employee-related expenditures submitted in the FY 2020 grant applications. The FY 2020 grant allocation includes the following personnel cost caps:

Additional Considerations

In addition to the information provided in each application, staff considered other factors to determine allocations to individual projects. These factors included performance-based variables such as benchmarking factors and grant administration. Staff also considered data related to the illicit drug environment existing in each county to support the continued need for grant resources, specifically public health data related to drug use, Arizona Youth Survey data, and drug arrest data reported by the Department of Public Safety.

The recommendation for the Attorney General's Office, Medicaid Fraud project, would require the grant period to run from October 1, 2019, to September 30, 2020. This project would provide matching funds for a federal grant, and the grant period needs to run concurrent to the federal fiscal year. As such, this project will only be allocated state funds, and a match is not applied. All other projects would have a grant period of July 1, 2019, to June 30, 2020.

Compliance with State Statue and Federal Grant Requirements

The recommendation would comply with the provision in A.R.S. § 41-2402 that limits distribution of monies in the Drug and Gang Enforcement Account up to 50 percent for law enforcement agencies, up to 50 percent for prosecution programs/agencies, up to 30 percent for court

programs/agencies, up to 30 percent for corrections agencies, and up to 30 percent for criminal justice records integration.

The recommendation would also meet the Byrne JAG variable pass-through requirement of 66.9%. BJA calculates the proportionate criminal justice spending by state and local government and requires the local government percentage to be passed down to local agencies in the state. This recommendation would pass through 72.8% to local governments.

The recommendation also meets the BJA requirement for "less than \$10,000" jurisdictions. Some units of local government are ineligible for a direct JAG award from BJA because of the small size of the grant. Funding from these small jurisdictions is added up and allocated in the state JAG award. The amount for this grant year is \$216,197. The state can grant out these amounts to the small jurisdictions or award the funding to a state police department. The recommendation meets this requirement through the award to the DPS forensic support project.

Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program FY 2020 Funding Recommendation

The Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program is established to provide grant awards to support direct services to crime victims in the State of Arizona. At the January 2019 meeting, the Commission approved a program size up to \$750,000 in victim assistance grant awards for FY20.

For the FY20 grant period, the Commission approved awarding victim assistance funding in accordance with the following tier structure:

Tier 1

Fund projects identified as VOCA Assistance *ineligible*, for a period beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2020. Projects must meet ACJC victim assistance grant program eligibility requirements.

Tier 2

Fund crime victim service training projects, for a period beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2020. Projects must meet current ACJC victim assistance grant program eligibility requirements.

Tier 3

Fund all other victim service projects that meet ACJC victim assistance grant program eligibility requirements, for a period beginning July 1, 2019, and ending June 30, 2020. Projects demonstrating the lowest percentage of funding support from DPS-VOCA Assistance grant funds during the grant period will be prioritized.

Budget Category Prioritization

Priority was given to projects requesting funding to support Personnel Services and Employee Related Expenses. This budget category prioritization will be applied across all funding tiers. Funding requests for other budget categories were only considered if all eligible requests for Personnel Service and Employee Related Expenses within a funding tier had been funded.

Applications Received

On February 1, 2019, the FY20 Crime Victim Assistance Program grant application period opened. The deadline for submission of applications was Friday, March 22, 2019, at 3:00 p.m. Thirty-six applications were submitted by the deadline. The following is a breakdown of applications received by funding tier:

Evaluation and Scoring

All grant application requests were evaluated in accordance with A.R.S. § 41-2702. All applications received were reviewed and scored by three individuals, including ACJC staff and an outside evaluator. Scoring was based on the Crime Victim Assistance Grant Program rules, application criteria, and priorities approved by the Commission. Financial audit documentation submitted by applicants was reviewed to help determine an applicant agency's capacity to administer an award.

FY 2020 Funding Recommendation

General Overview

ACJC Victim Services Staff recommends victim assistance grant awards totaling \$750,000 for FY20. This award total equals the \$750,000 program size approved by the Commission in January.

Tier 1 Award Detail

Tier 1 attempts to identify and prioritize funding for projects that are ineligible under the guidelines of the DPS-VOCA assistance grant program. Of the seventeen applications included under Tier 1, fourteen included budget requests that were determined to be DPS-VOCA assistance ineligible and in line with the priorities established by the Commission for an award. The activities included in these applications are the gap activities Tier 1 set out to identify and support. The following is a list of those Tier 1 eligible activities and associated projects:

- Civil Legal Support Services for Victims
 - Arizona Crime Victim Rights Law Group
 - Homicide Survivors, Inc.
 - Never Again Foundation
- Project personnel costs (other than direct service providers)
 - Child Crisis Arizona
 - Colorado River Regional Crisis Services
 - Navajo County Attorney's Office
 - New Life Center
 - Pinal County Attorney's Office
 - Streetlight USA
 - Tucson Centers for Women and Children
- On-call time for direct victim service providers
 - o Chrysalis Shelter for Victims of Domestic Violence
 - Haven Family Resource Center
 - Kingman Aid to Abused People
 - Victim / Witness Services for Coconino County

The scoring team recommended funding these projects to the degree the requests were determined to be VOCA Assistance ineligible, and the extent to which projects were aligned with the ACJC victim assistance grant program rules and funding priorities for the FY20 grant period.

Tier 2 Award Detail

Tier 2 establishes as an independent funding priority, training of staff or volunteers associated with programs providing direct service to victims of crime. Five applications were submitted for training projects under Tier 2. The following four projects were recommended for funding:

- Arizona Coalition for Victim Services Arizona Victim Assistance Academy
- Arizona Coalition for Victim Services Mobile Training Program
- Purple Ribbon Council (Bloom365) Bloom It Up/Trusted Adult Ally Training
- Tempe City Social Services CARE 7 Trauma Awareness Training

Tier 3 Award Detail

Awards under Tier 3 are open to any project that meets the eligibility requirements established under the ACJC victim assistance program rules. Funding recommendations were based on the degree to which eligible projects receive additional funding support through the DPS-VOCA assistance grant during the grant period. Projects receiving no funding through DPS-VOCA assistance were the highest priority under Tier 3. The following five Tier 3 projects lacked any funding support from DPS-VOCA assistance, and are recommended for an ACJC victim assistance grant award:

- Ama Doo Alchini Bighan, Inc. (ADABI)
- Buckeye Police Department
- Gila County Attorney's Office
- Legal Services for Crime Victims in Arizona
- Mt. Graham Safe House, Inc.

Historically, the Commission has prioritized continuing funding from one grant period to the next for projects funded during the current grant period. The following four Tier 3 projects have submitted a quality application for the upcoming grant period and currently meet all requirements of the active FY19 award:

- Coconino County Attorney's Office
- Community Alliance Against Family Abuse (CAAFA)
- Graham County Attorney's Office
- Yavapai County Attorney's Office

The funding recommendation includes utilizing remaining victim assistance grant funding to support the following two projects based on the quality of the application submitted and the alignment of requests with the priorities established by the Commission for the grant period:

- City of Maricopa
- Verde Valley Sanctuary
