how the Department and the multiple state, federal, tribal, and NGO partners work cooperatively to manage the repatriation efforts of the California condor in Arizona/Utah.

- 4) **Lower Gila River Collaborative and Rio Reimagined Information Update. Presenter: Kelly Wolff, Habitat Evaluation and Lands Program Manager, Mesa.** Informational Presentation on the Landscape Scale Collaboration occurring along the Lower Gila River.
- 5) **Memorandum of Understanding with the National Audubon Society, Inc. Presenter: Josh T. Avey, Terrestrial Wildlife Branch Chief, Terrestrial Branch.** The Commission will be briefed and may approve a Memorandum of Understanding with the National Audubon Society, Inc. for the purpose of conservation and management of wildlife and related educational programs, primarily to benefit SGCN through Important Bird Areas and other similar projects.
- 6) **State and Federal Lands Planning Update. Presenter: Luke Thompson, Habitat, Lands, and Evaluation Branch Chief.** The Commission will be updated on Department activities and involvement with land management planning and other actions regarding state and federal lands in Arizona.
- 7) **Consideration of Proposed Commission Orders 2, 6-10, and 26 for 2021–22 Hunting Seasons and Commission Orders 13 and 23 for the 2021–22 and 2022-23 Seasons. Presenter: Amber Munig, Big Game Management Program Supervisor.** The Commission will consider and may approve Commission Orders 2 (deer), 6-10 (javelina, bighorn sheep, bison, bear, and mountain lion), and 26 (population management) establishing seasons and season dates, bag, permit numbers, and open areas for the 2021–22 seasons. The Commission will also consider and may approve Commission Orders 13 (predatory and fur-bearing mammals) and 23 (trapping), establishing season dates, legal species, open and closed areas, and bag and possession limits for the 2021–22 and 2022-23 seasons. A detailed description of proposals is available for public review at Department offices.
- 8) **Consideration of Proposed Commission Orders 11-18 (Small Game and Predator/Furbearer) for 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 hunting seasons and Commission Orders 19–22 and 24 (Migratory Game Birds) for the 2021-2022 hunting season. Presenter: Dr. Larisa Harding, Small Game Management Program Supervisor.** The Commission will consider and may approve Commission Orders 11 (tree squirrel), 12 (cottontail rabbit), 13, (predator/furbearer), 14 (other birds and mammals), 15 (pheasant), 16 (quail), 17 (chukar partridge), 18 (dusky grouse), establishing seasons and season dates, bag and possession limits, and open areas for the 2021-2022 and 2022-2023 seasons. The Commission will also consider and may approve Commission Orders 19-22 (dove, band-tailed pigeon, waterfowl, and snipe) and 24 (sandhill crane), establishing season dates, open and closed areas, bag and possession limits, and permit numbers (for CO 24 sandhill cranes only) for the 2021-2022 hunting season. 

- c. Legal Advice.** The Commission may vote to meet in executive session in accordance with A.R.S. § 38-431.03(A)(3) for the purpose of discussing and consulting with legal counsel for legal advice regarding the Commission's authority to close state trust lands to hunting and to close roads providing access to state trust lands.
- d. During the public meeting, the Commission may afford any person, their duly authorized representative, or both, the opportunity to present statements relating to agenda items, with or without the opportunity to present them orally. The Commission may go into Executive Session for the purpose of obtaining legal advice from the Commission Attorneys on any of the above agenda items pursuant to A.R.S. § 38-431.03 (A) (3) & (4). One or more members of the Commission may appear and participate in the meeting telephonically or by other electronic means.

The Arizona Game and Fish Department is responsible for managing Arizona's fish and wildlife resource as an enduring public trust. In addition, the Department is charged with promoting safe and responsible use of watercraft and off-highway vehicles. Funding is provided from the sale of licenses and permits; watercraft registration fees; federal excise taxes on firearms, fishing equipment, boats, and other sporting goods; State lottery revenues; donations on State income tax forms; and various contracts and grants. Department policy is set by the Arizona Game and Fish Commission, whose five members are appointed by the Governor.
